A HAPPY ENDING

Dearly loved and respected Bible teacher and campus chaplain, Linda Vigil, retired at the end of the 2023-24 school year. What a legacy of unselfish love and service she leaves behind!

Fortunately for Academy students, staff, and many others in the church and community, the Vigil family–Linda, Tim, and Kelli—chose to leave California for Hutchinson, Minnesota, in August of 1993. The original plan was to move closer to Linda's family and be part of a community that had Christian schools. Tim used his RN degree to work at the local hospital while Linda chose to be a stay-at-home Mom with their two-year old daughter, who was later joined by her sister, Jennifer.

As the years unfolded, there was a need for a part time health teacher at Maplewood, which Linda filled; she also taught a Bible class when that calling arose. Later she joined the staff as assistant cafeteria director, then development director, and then she became a full-time teacher for various classes—English, Bible, Family and Consumer science—eventually becoming campus chaplain in 2014.

As Maplewood's chaplain, she was responsible for all spiritual activities, spiritual retreats, and mission

trips. She worked very closely with many students on these projects and had a profound influence on their lives. Former student Olivia Sweet ('20) rightly noted that, "Mrs. Vigil has impacted the lives of countless students that have entered her classroom. . .not only through the curriculum, but simply through the example of how she leads her life and carries herself with an aura of spiritual devotion and loving kindness." Many have noted the deep personal interest and positive encouragement she shares with everyone. Nicolas Cruz ('19) commented that, "Mrs. Vigil helped me create an actual connection with Jesus on a personal level. I thank God for letting God shine through her." Students were well aware that Mrs. Vigil truly loved and believed in them and that she prayed for them personally.

One of Vigil's favorite parts of being campus chaplain was organizing and leading out in many mission

trips over the years–trips to Kentucky, Navajo Indian missions in Arizona and New Mexico, a mega health clinic in Dallas, Texas, trips to Puerto Rico and Belize, as well as helping out with various schools and churches in Minnesota. When asked what made these mission trips so special, Vigil remarked that it was the students–always the students– who were so passionate in their desire to be part of this witnessing experience and willing to work so hard to make it possible. Mission trips have been transformational for many Maplewood students throughout the years. The connections Maplewood students have made with the children they ministered to were especially touching and meaningful.

Both of the Vigils have had to deal with serious health issues over the years, but God has led them through these challenges, and they are both so very thankful for the privilege and blessing of working for Him. Linda also credits husband, Tim, for being a huge support to her, as well as to the academy, the church, and the community. One can frequently see Tim helping out on campus wherever he finds a need, and we fully expect to see both of the Vigils continue to serve the Lord as they are able to and also have the freedom to spend more time with family and reconnecting with friends.

Annika Swanson-Lane ('24) summed up her thoughts about Vigil's retirement by saying, "Mrs. Vigil has always shown the love of Jesus to us students. Whether she was teaching us in class or listening to us after class or praying over our worries, she was always a kind and calming presence. She will be missed at Maplewood." We wish every blessing to the Vigils in the next chapter of their lives.

Over Spring Break a group of Maplewood students and staff traveled to New Mexico to serve at La Vida Mission, an outreach school for Navajo youth. The volunteers cleaned greenhouses, removed dead trees, cleared brush, constructed a trail, laid linoleum, installed plumbing, repaired chainsaws and tillers, and worked on vehicles. On Sabbath the group led two church services and a Sabbath School class with music, lesson study, and preaching. They also learned more about Native American history by visiting a national park. Devin told us, "Even though sometimes I really don't feel like reading the Bible, I still read it. I make myself sit down and take the time to read it."

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doing other things. But Devin is right. Every single day we need to dedicate ourselves to reading the Bible, even when we don't feel like it.

One of our group members, Samantha, looked up some Bible verses about baptism and randomly found a Bible study sheet written by our Hutchinson pastor's wife, Kara Aguilar. That was really cool but strange, because Samantha said she never keeps the Bible studies in her Bible but stuffs them into her dorm room somewhere. We gave Devin the Bible study sheet and told him how Mrs. Aguilar was putting together a book on different study methods. He was pretty excited about that.

We all prayed with Devin before leaving. I think we all walked away from that 11 p.m. conversation smiling and feeling blessed. I sure did. I hope we can all have that same faith and burning desire to learn more about Christ every single day.

My life is deeply rooted in Adventist education. My father was a teacher, as well as my grandparents on both sides of the family; my Grandpa Evan taught at Maplewood Academy for 56 years. I always knew that I would be in the Adventist education system; I just didn't know how much of an impact it would have on my life.

The first school I attended was Northwoods Elementary School in first grade. My teacher Miss Weyant taught me about math, English, history, etc. These things were important, but more importantly, she taught me about God in new ways. My favorite part of being in her class was singing during morning worship. Miss Weyant had a special mailbox where we could submit song requests for worship and then she would play them and we would sing along. It may have seemed small at the time, but those years were the first years I started to truly connect with God through music. In fourth grade, I became a student at the newly reopened Blackberry SDA Church School. My first teacher there was Miss Nelson. She was also patient when I refused to learn any of my memory verses. Memorization was hard for me, and so I thought I would fail whether I tried or not. But she helped us learn these verses in so many different ways. We played games on the white board, used Scripture Typer, and practiced reciting them as a group. Eventually I wanted to learn my memory verses, and those are verses I can still recite today. Without Miss Nelson I wouldn't have so many powerful verses hidden in my heart.



By the time seventh grade rolled around, my dad was teaching at the church school. I got to see him doing what he loved as he taught me and other students about Christ as well as academics. Being one of the only "upper graders" in a one-room Adventist school is definitely different than going to a regular middle school. When I finished my schoolwork, I got to help the younger kids. I loved working with the kindergarteners on reading and math, and it made me realize how special Adventist education is. It made me want to work with kids and influence them for Christ. Because my dad gave me the opportunity to get involved, he inspired a desire in me to potentially be an educator one day.

Now I'm a senior entering into my fourth year at Maplewood Academy. I couldn't even begin to explain the impact that Maplewood has had on me.
